

Years ago, the BHS was given many items from the Bradford Women's Club. The Bradford Women's Club (BWC) was a very important organization in our town for many years. When reviewing some items, I found many "Programs" for events. The Women's Club sold these Programs for 10 cents at their street fairs and Annual Fairs to all that attended. In one of the Annual Fair Programs of August 8, 1945, was an article called "BRIEF HISTORY OF BRADFORD, N.H" which follows:

Tradition names Isaac Davis as first settler in 1762. However, first authenticated record dates 1770 naming Deacon Wm. Presbury, who moved up here from Henniker. In 1714<sup>(1)</sup> several families moved here from Bradford, Mass., naming the settlement New Bradford. First Town Meeting was held in 1786 but the town did not receive its charter until March 27, 1787. In early days the centre of population was the Centre of the town. Here were built the first school and meetinghouse, cobbler and blacksmith shops, taverns, stores, homes and Town Pound which can still be seen near the old Centre Church. In 1825 the railroad was extended to Bradford and since then the "north-east" village so called, has been the center of municipal activities. West of the tracks was known as Mill-Village, and east of them the Corner. At the corner stood the old Raymond House, visited in 1825 by General Lafayette. Here over a century later was dedicated our new schoolhouse. (2) Located in the "Mill Village" are the Baptist Church (1836), Town Hall (1863), the beautiful Brown Library, and the earliest store still in existence, established in 1824 by Daniel Carr. Bradford stands today as it has always stood, for the highest traditions of American citizenship, proud of its past, progressive and looking towards its future!
